CEMETERY UPDATE

<u>A number of our old Ebenezer monuments suffered damage this year</u>, likely due to the cold winter and ice storms. The Foundation has formed a committee and is searching for an experienced repair person to hire for work on our cemetery stones. Please let us know if you could do this or know of someone. In addition, many of our stones need attention. There are two very safe products to use for cleaning old tombstones: "D2" [buy on line] and "Wet and Forget" [Ace Hardware]. They keep on working for several months when it rains. Never use bleach, especially on granite, as permanent damage will occur. As you may know, there are some 550 marked burials at Ebenezer and others not marked. The Thompson Foundation has purchased a total of sixteen pillow stones, mostly for our kinfolks who had none.
